One of our major accomplishments was the opening of our new UMC Surgical Hospital in east El Paso. We expanded our pediatric services with the acquisition of Healthy Days Pediatrics in west El Paso and added a new service line offering inpatient rehabilitative services through an established joint venture with PAM Health Rehabilitation Hospital.

Our commitment to continue finding ways to better care for our families and our community is steadfast, and I thank all of our healthcare professionals who have embraced this new era of technology that will without a doubt, continue to revolutionize the remarkable things we do for our region.

Fiscal 2023 was another year of volume growth and efficiency throughout the District – UMC of El Paso, El Paso Children's and El Paso Health. As shown below, these increases are impressive:



UMC El Paso

- Inpatient admissions increased to 16,855 a 6% increase from 2022.
- Emergency Room Visits increased to 93,421 a 2% increase from 2022.
- Births increased to 3,007 a 6% increase from 2022.
- Outpatient Visits increased to 1,001,626 a 3% increase from 2022.
- Surgery Cases increased to 10,597 a 10% increase from 2022.

El Paso Children's Hospital

- Inpatient admissions increased to 4,442 a 2% increase from 2022.
- Emergency Room Visits increased to 28,625 a 5% increase from 2022.
- Outpatient Visits increased to 78,675 a 31% increase from 2022.
- Surgery Cases increased to 4,355 a 9% increase from 2022.

El Paso Health

- El Paso Health maintained its Medicaid market share leader status once again a feat since 2013.
- El Paso Health's total membership (Medicaid, Third-Party Administrator, and Medicare) remained over 100,000 members monthly.

Both UMC of El Paso and El Paso Children's could have further increased patient volume and revenue with greater capacity.

Overall, as directors and departments at both hospitals worked within their budgets to provide and expand care, the District proved again that it is a model of efficiency and fiscally responsible steward of it's resources and those of the County of El Paso.







UMC Introduces New Colonoscopy Screening Technology Using Al

University Medical Center of El Paso's Digestive Health Center has implemented the use of the region's first intelligent endoscopy module called the Gl GeniusTM.

This computer-aided polyp detection system is powered by artificial



intelligence (AI) to find colorectal polyps during a colonoscopy screening.

Having this technology available to our patients is a huge step in identifying suspicious lesions, which could be an indicator of colorectal cancer.

The GI Genius[™] will serve as a "second observer" during colonoscopies, improving the adenoma detection rate (ADR), which is the number of times a

physician detects a precancerous polyp during a colonoscopy screening, and identifying missed lesions.

Colorectal cancer is treatable and beatable, with early diagnosis.

The GI Genius[™] module is the first and only AI system for detection of colon polyps in the United States and UMC is proud to offer it to our patients here in EI Paso.

A New, Improved Surgery Robot Introduced at UMC

University Medical Center of El Paso is the only hospital in El Paso to implement the use of a high-performance single-port robotic surgical system called DaVinci SP by Intuitive.

UMC is proud to continue leading the way in advanced medical technology for El Paso by introducing this new technology that gives surgeons the ability to deliver robotic-assisted surgery through a single port, instead of multiple ports.

The Da Vinci SP system provides 360-degrees of anatomical access through three wristed instruments on a single port. This updated model helps surgeons perform complex procedures and allows them the flexibility to control the robot from a position other than bedside.

The use of the Da Vinci SP makes surgeries less invasive and allows patients to leave the hospital quicker, with less pain and less long-term difficulties.





Currently, the Da Vinci SP robot is being used at UMC to remove throat cancer, and for surgeries to alter the anatomy of the back of the throat to treat sleep apnea, but can be used for a variety of narrow access surgeries.



UMC Surgeons Perform First of its Kind Vascular Surgery in El Paso

A new procedure to repair damage to the largest artery in the chest was performed by vascular surgeons at UMC in August.

El Paso's first Thoracic Branch Endoprosthesis surgery was conducted by Dr. Gilbert Aidinian, Division Chief of Vascular and Endovascular surgery at UMC, and Dr. Alireza Daneshpajouh, Director of Vascular

Clinic Services at UMC.



The vascular surgery consists of implanting the FDA approved GORETAG Thoracic Branch Endoprosthesis in the descending thoracic aorta and into a blood vessel that branches off the aorta toward the head to allow blood to keep flowing past the aorta's damaged or diseased parts.

"This is another example of the higher level of care that

patients rely on at UMC," said Jacob Cintron, President & CEO, El Paso County Hospital District. "Vascular surgery excellence is exactly what we were striving for with the introduction of our Vascular and Endovascular Surgery Clinic. Dr. Aidinian is yet again bringing new firsts to our region, along with better health outcomes for patients."

The types of damage that can be repaired with this procedure include aneurysm, transection and dissection of the descending thoracic aorta.

UMC is proud to offer this minimally invasive surgery not available anywhere else in El Paso, except at UMC.


UMC Rolls Out New Mail-Order Prescription Delivery Service

"Through this new joint venture, El Pasoans will be able to receive a high level of personalized attention and one-on-one treatment from physical, occupational, and speech therapists in



a state-of-the-art facility," said Jacob Cintron, President and CEO of UMC El Paso. "This partnership falls in line with our mission to pursue access to healthcare for all members of our community and exceeding their expectations every time."

PAM Health provides a wide-range of comprehensive programs that ensure high-quality care in a comfortable setting that includes private family suites.

Pursuing Upward Learning Legacy Opportunity Program Helps Associate Achieve Her Dream

Looking back at when she first started working as a certified nurse assistant (CNA) at UMC three years ago, Raquel Salas did not think continuing her education in the medical field would be possible, but it was at UMC.

Salas is the second graduate of UMC's Pursuing Upward Learning Legacy Opportunity (PULL-Opp) program, which was designed to help further advance Associates' education and training in a high-demand healthcare related field.

Through this program, UMC covers the cost of tuition for the Associate, who is able to maintain full-time employment status and compensation during the duration of their schooling, while working part-time.



"Getting my LVN was hard because I had to work and go to school and I have my family, but it is possible," said Salas. "The PULL-Opp program helped me a lot with working only two days instead of three and so, it helped that I was only working on the weekends."

Salas believes her story is proof that continuing your education while working is possible. She encourages other Associates to look into the resources offered at UMC.

This team, which provides services to 36 counties in Texas, has worked extremely hard to pass their certification exams.

"I'm very proud," said Salvador Baeza, Director of the West Texas Regional Poison Center at University Medical Center of El Paso. "The team had to study in addition to working and it's a lot of prep work."

Baeza said the certification process is not easy, but regardless, all of the team was able to pass the exam on the first try.

Juana Roman, Spec. Poison Information RN, is among the group of poison control specialists who passed their certification exam. She believes being part of a team who is 100 percent certified by the American Association

of Poison Control Centers is a huge advantage to the community, especially during a potentially life-threatening situation.

"This means when you are talking to somebody at our poison center, you know you are talking to someone who put a lot of effort into knowing how to help you and properly advise you. That makes all the difference," said Roman.



University Medical Center of El Paso's Digestive Health Center, in conjunction with Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center El Paso (TTUHSC), have been awarded the 2023 SCOPY Screening Excellence Award by the American College of Gastroenterology.

This service award recognizes efforts in colorectal cancer outreach, prevention, and yearround excellence.

Through the Southwest Coalition for Colorectal Cancer Screening (SuCCCes) program, UMC and TTUHSC have increased colorectal cancer screenings and built a sustainable screening, diagnosis, and treatment network for colorectal cancer prevention in the community.

Dr. Marc Zuckerman, Texas Tech Physicians of El Paso, Professor of Medicine at Texas

Tech University Health Sciences Center and Division of Gastroenterology Chief at UMC, performs a procedure.

The program uses bilingual community health workers,

known as "promotoras," to educate uninsured patients at health fairs, food banks, religious institutions, schools, and adult learning centers. Participants who have a family history or positive FIT test are eligible for a no-cost colonoscopy through this program.

Since 2012, the program has enrolled 41,978 people, provided 1,092 diagnostic colonoscopies and diagnosed 33 cancers.

The program covers a 27-county area spanning El Paso, Hudspeth, and West Texas.

UMC Receives Exclusive Recognition for Patient Outcomes, Procedures

University Medical Center of El Paso (UMC) has been deemed meritorious in outcomes of inpatient and outpatient surgical procedures by The American



College of Surgeons National Surgical Quality Improvement Program (ACS NSQIP®).
